



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: All Cap Blend Style

The All Cap Blend style ranks second out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our <u>2Q17 Style Ratings for</u> <u>ETFs and Mutual Funds</u> report. <u>Last quarter</u>, the All Cap Blend style ranked second as well. It gets our Attractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 82 ETFs and 647 mutual funds in the All Cap Blend style as of April 20, 2017. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all All Cap Blend style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 8 to 4646). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the All Cap Blend style should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

Our <u>robo-analyst technology</u> empowers our unique <u>ETF and mutual fund rating methodology</u>, which leverages our rigorous analysis of each fund's holdings. We think advisors and investors focused on prudent investment decisions should include analysis of fund holdings in their research process for ETFs and mutual funds.

Green Owl Intrinsic Value Fund (GOWLX) and Women in Leadership U.S. Equity Portfolio (GWILX) are excluded from Figure 2 because their total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

First trust Long/Short Equity ETF (FTLS) is the top-rated All Cap Blend ETF and AQR Large Cap Multi-Style Fund (QCERX) is the top-rated All Cap Blend mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

Direxion Daily Energy Bull 3x Shares (ERX) is the worst rated All Cap Blend ETF and JPMorgan Global Unconstrained Equity Fund (JFUAX) is the worst rated All Cap Blend mutual fund. Both earn a Very Dangerous rating.






Figure 4: Separating the Best Mutual Funds From the Worst Funds

- The drivers of our <u>forward-looking fund ratings</u> are Portfolio Management (i.e. the aggregated ratings of its holdings) and Total Annual Costs. The Total Annual Costs Rating (<u>details here</u>) captures the all-in cost of being in a fund over a 3-year holding period, the average period for all fund investors.

Our Philosophy About Research

Accounting data is not designed for equity investors, but for debt investors. <u>Accounting data must be</u> <u>translated into economic earnings</u> to understand the profitability and valuation relevant to equity investors. Respected investors (e.g. Adam Smith, Warren Buffett and Ben Graham) have repeatedly emphasized that accounting results should not be used to value stocks. <u>Economic earnings</u> are what matter because they are:

- 1. Based on the complete set of financial information available.
- 2. Standard for all companies.
- 3. A more accurate representation of the true underlying cash flows of the business.
