



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Mid Cap Growth Style

The Mid Cap Growth style ranks ninth out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our [4Q18 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Mid Cap Growth style ranked tenth. It gets our Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 13 ETFs and 340 mutual funds in the Mid Cap Growth style as of October 24, 2018. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Mid Cap Growth style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 13 to 1685). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

BFOR is the top-rated Mid Cap Growth ETF and MCMFX is the top-rated Mid Cap Growth mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

JKH is the worst rated Mid Cap Growth ETF and OASGX is the worst rated Mid Cap Growth mutual fund. JKH earns an Unattractive rating and OASGX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

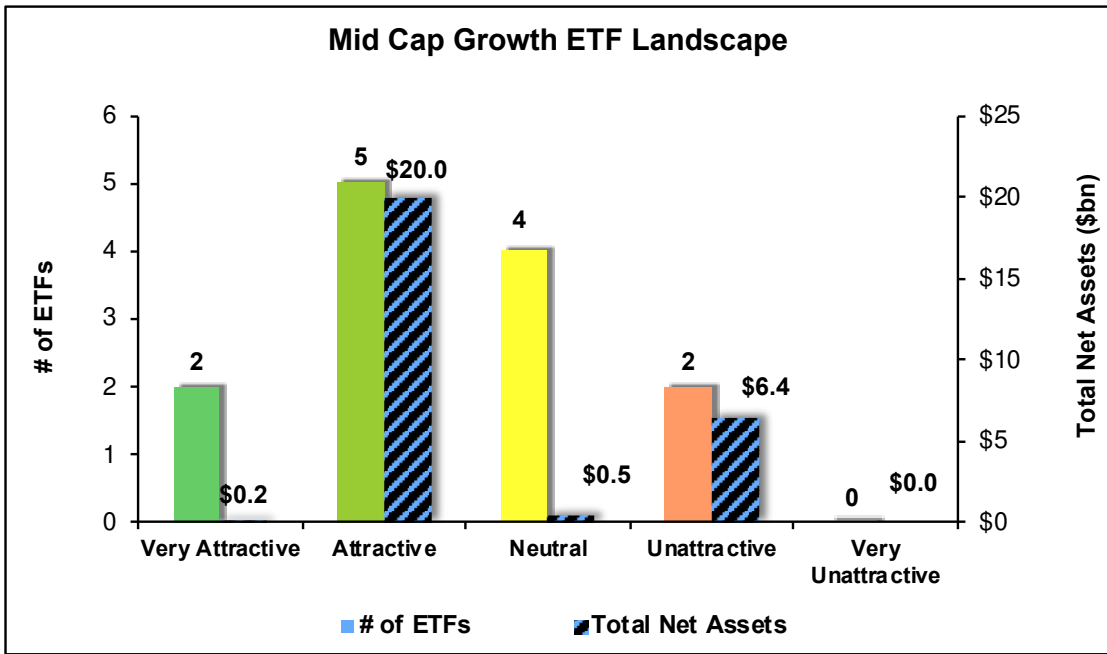

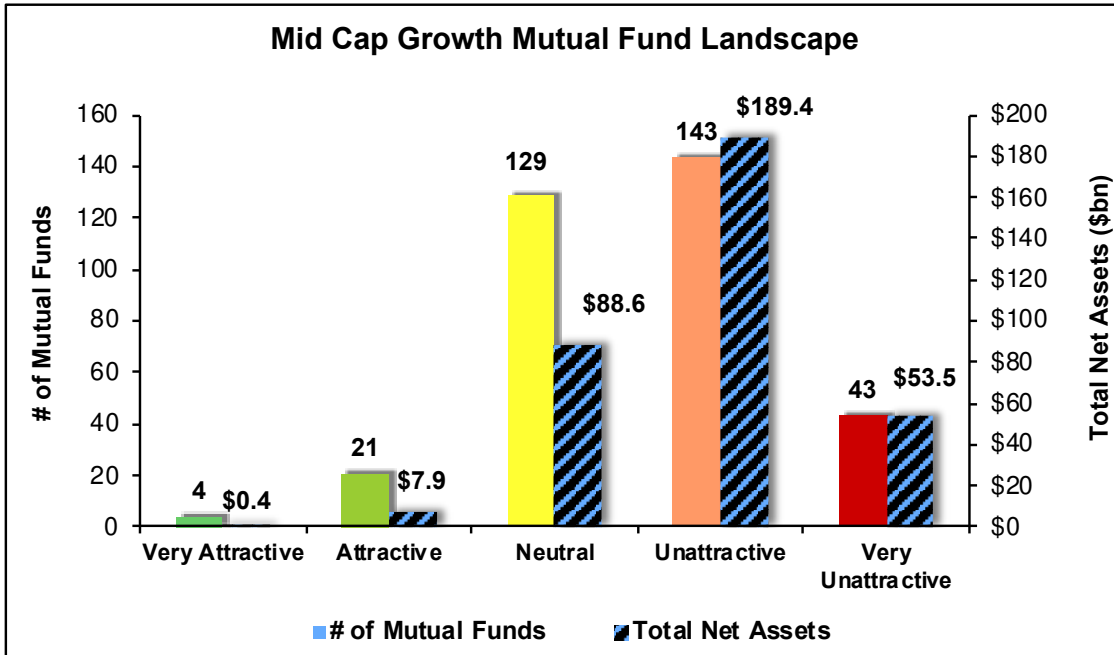
