

# ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Small Cap Blend Style

The Small Cap Blend style ranks tenth out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our <u>4Q18 Style Ratings for</u> <u>ETFs and Mutual Funds</u> report. <u>Last quarter</u>, the Small Cap Blend style ranked ninth. It gets our Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 48 ETFs and 828 mutual funds in the Small Cap Blend style as of October 25, 2018. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Small Cap Blend style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 24 to 3291). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

EZM is the top-rated Small Cap Blend ETF and FSSFX is the top-rated Small Cap Blend mutual fund. EZM earns an Attractive rating and FSSFX earns a Very Attractive rating.

PRFZ is the worst rated Small Cap Blend ETF and SLPSX is the worst rated Small Cap Blend mutual fund. PRFZ earns an Unattractive rating and SLPSX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

#### The Danger Within






Figure 4: Separating the Best Mutual Funds from the Worst Funds
