ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Mid Cap Growth Style

The Mid Cap Growth style ranks last out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our <u>3Q19 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds</u> report. <u>Last quarter</u>, the Mid Cap Growth style ranked eleventh. It gets our Very Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of nine ETFs and 359 mutual funds in the Mid Cap Growth style as of July 15, 2019. Figure 1 ranks from best to worst the seven Mid Cap Growth ETFs that meet our liquidity standards and Figure 2 shows the five best and worst rated Mid Cap Growth mutual funds. Not all Mid Cap Growth style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 13 to 1727). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the Mid Cap Growth style should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

Barron's 400 ETF (BFOR) is the top-rated Mid Cap Growth ETF and AMG Managers Cadence Mid Cap Fund (MCMFX) is the top-rated Mid Cap Growth mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

Renaissance IPO ETF (IPO) is the worst rated Mid Cap Growth ETF and Optimum Small Mid Cap Growth Fund (OASGX) is the worst rated Mid Cap Growth mutual fund. IPO earns an Unattractive rating and OASGX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

Put another way, research on fund holdings is necessary due diligence because a fund's performance is only as good as its holdings' performance. 

Figure 3: Separating the Best ETFs from the Worst Funds


Mid Cap Growth ETF Landscape
