



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Technology Sector

The Technology sector ranks ninth out of the 11 sectors as detailed in our [3Q19 Sector Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Technology sector ranked eighth. It gets our Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of the 443 stocks in the Technology sector as of July 11, 2019. See a recap of our [2Q19 Sector Ratings here](#).

Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the sector. Not all Technology sector ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 17 to 335). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the Technology sector should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

Four mutual funds (STPIX, FDMIX, ICTEX, FDMCX) are excluded from Figure 2 because their total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

TDIV is the top-rated Technology ETF and ROGSX is the top-rated Technology mutual fund. TDIV earns a Very Attractive rating and ROGSX earns an Attractive rating.

ARKK is the worst rated Technology ETF and ADNAX is the worst Technology mutual fund. They both earn a Very Unattractive rating.

443 stocks of the 2800+ we cover are classified as Technology stocks.

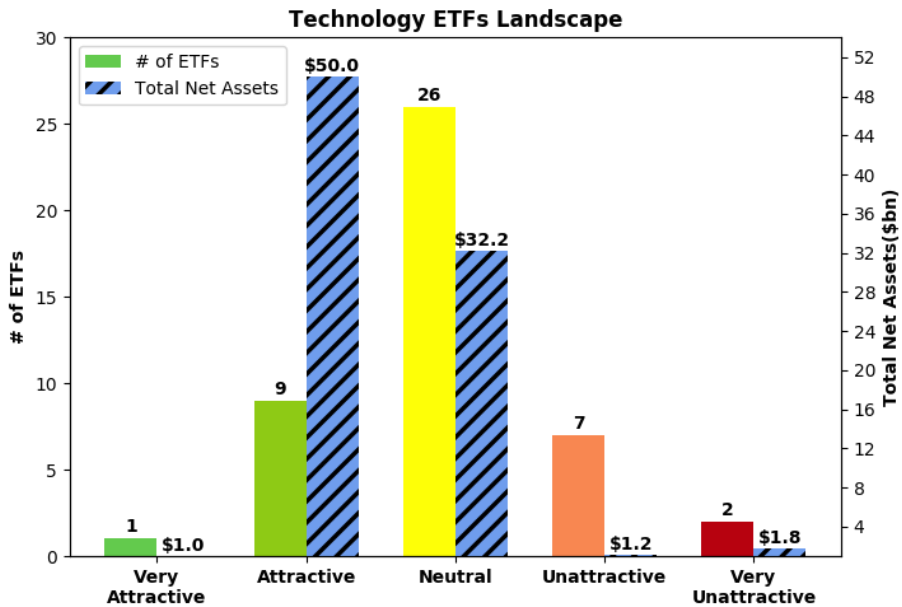

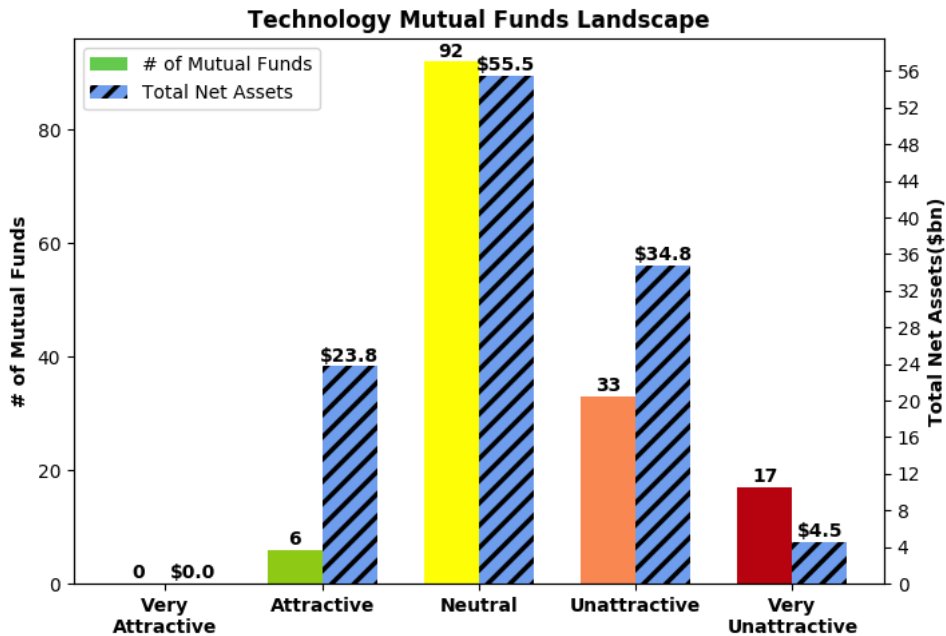
