



## ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Technology Sector

The Technology sector ranks eighth out of the 11 sectors as detailed in our [3Q20 Sector Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Technology sector ranked eighth. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of the 453 stocks in the Technology sector as of July 11, 2020. See a recap of our [2Q20 Sector Ratings here](#).

Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the sector. Not all Technology sector ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 21 to 383). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Five mutual funds (FDMIX, FDMCX, HTCIX, HTECX, STPIX) are excluded from Figure 2 because their total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

TDIV is the top-rated Technology ETF and FSDCX is the top-rated Technology mutual fund. Both earn an Attractive rating.

WCLD is the worst rated Technology ETF and RSIFX is the worst Technology mutual fund. They both earn a Very Unattractive rating.

453 stocks of the 2850+ we cover are classified as Technology stocks.

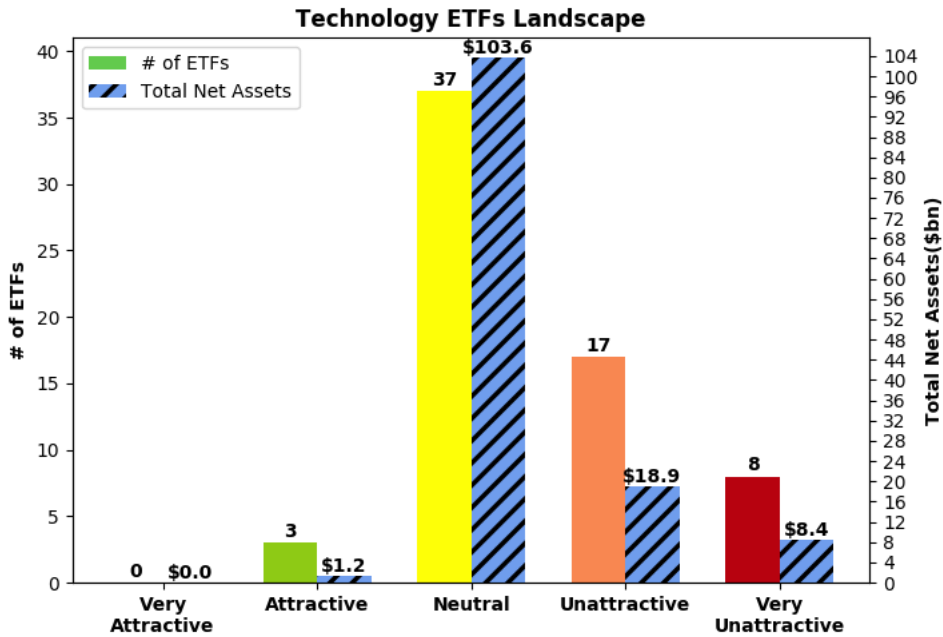

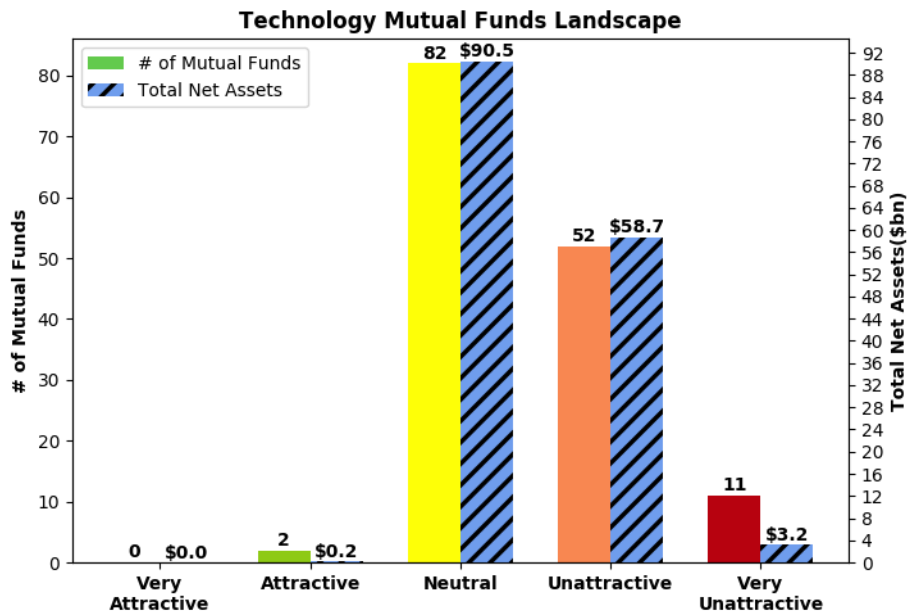
