



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Mid Cap Blend Style

The Mid Cap Blend style ranks seventh out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our [4Q20 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Mid Cap Blend style ranked sixth. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 21 ETFs and 341 mutual funds in the Mid Cap Blend style as of October 20, 2020. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Mid Cap Blend style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 17 to 2431). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Victory RS Investors Fund (RSIYX, RSIKX, RIVCX) is excluded from Figure 2 because its total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

State Street SPDR Russell 1000 Low Volatility Focus ETF (ONEV) is the top-rated Mid Cap Blend ETF and Janus Henderson Mid Cap Value Fund (JDPNX) is the top-rated Mid Cap Blend mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

Invesco Raymond James SB-1 Equity ETF (RYJ) is the worst rated Mid Cap Blend ETF and Goldman Sachs Mid Cap Value Fund (GCMAX) is the worst rated Mid Cap Blend mutual fund. RYJ earns an Unattractive rating and GCMAX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

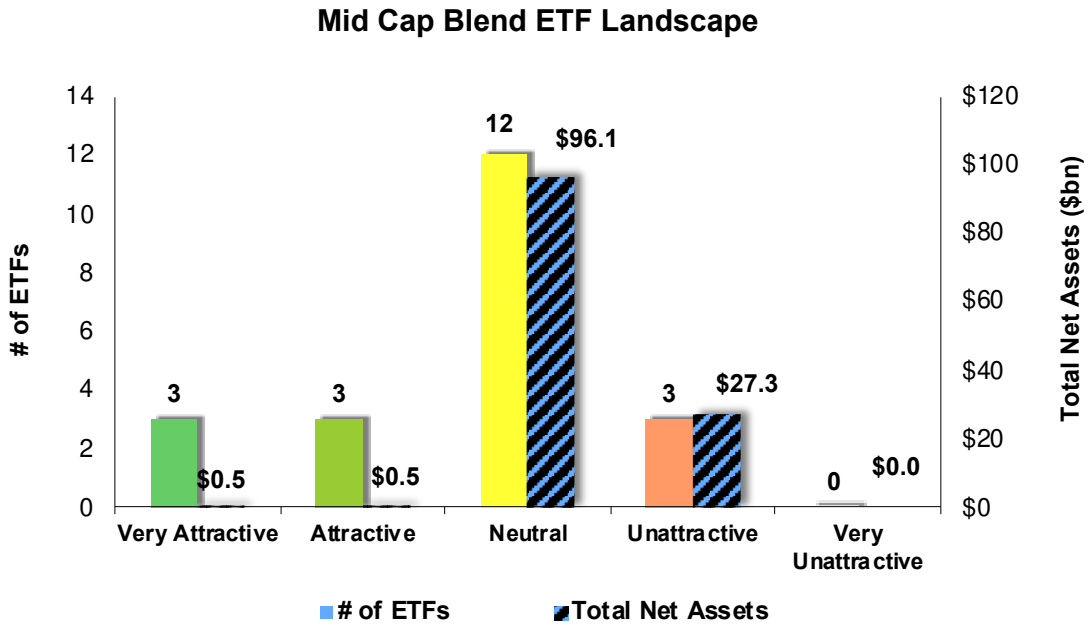

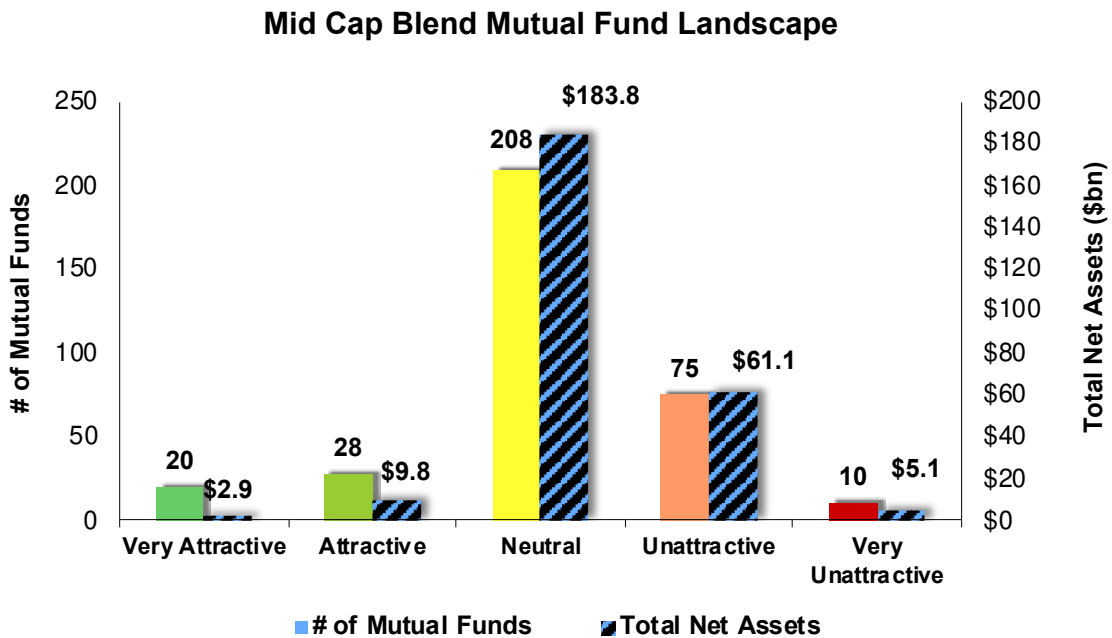
