



## How to Find the Best Sector ETFs

With an ever-growing list of similar-sounding ETFs to choose from, finding the best is an increasingly difficult task. How can investors change the game to shift the odds in their favor?

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### Don't Trust ETF Labels

There are at least 94 different Technology ETFs and at least 323 ETFs across eleven sectors. Do investors need 29+ choices on average per sector? How different can the ETFs be?

Those 94 Technology ETFs are very different from each other. With anywhere from 22 to 543 holdings, many of these Technology ETFs have drastically different portfolios with differing risk profiles and performance outlooks.

The same is true for the ETFs in any other sector, as each offers a very different mix of good and bad stocks. Energy ranks first for stock selection. Telecom Services ranks last. Details on the [Best & Worst ETFs in each sector are here](#).

### Avoiding Analysis Paralysis

We think the large number of sector ETFs hurts investors more than it helps. Manually conducting a deep analysis for every ETF is simply not a realistic option, exposing investors to insufficient analysis and missing profitable opportunities. Analyzing ETFs, with the proper diligence<sup>1</sup>, is far more difficult than analyzing stocks because it means analyzing all the stocks within each ETF. As stated above, there can be as many as 543 stocks or more for one ETF.

Anyone focused on [fulfilling the fiduciary duty of care](#) recognizes that analyzing the holdings<sup>2</sup> of an ETF is critical to finding the best ETF. More [reliable](#) & [proprietary](#) fundamental data, proven in [The Journal of Financial Economics](#), drives our research and analysis of ETF holdings and provides investors with a [new source of alpha](#). Amongst the ETFs in Figure 1, VanEck Steel ETF (SLX) ranks first overall, Invesco Building & Construction ETF (PKB) ranks second, and iShares U.S. Home Construction ETF (ITB) ranks third. Fidelity MSCI Utilities Index ETF (FUTY) ranks last.

VanEck Steel ETF (SLX) is not only the top-rated Basic Materials ETF but is also the overall top-rated sector ETF out of the 323 sector ETFs that we cover.

The worst ETF in Figure 1 is Fidelity MSCI Utilities Index ETF (FUTY), which gets a Very Unattractive rating. One would think ETF providers could do better for this sector.
